In our previous newsletter we introduced you to #72, the rhino bull that we had taken in following numerous failed poaching attempts. His condition was critical and the likelihood of a full recovery was slim. Despite our veterinary team doing everything in their power to save him, sadly #72 did not survive.

An autopsy was conducted, and the results revealed that there was nothing more that could have been done to save his life. [Read more](#)

It's amazing how quickly time passes. It seems like just yesterday that Salome the cheetah gave birth to five beautiful cubs.

The cheetah mom and her cubs have now been moved out of the maternity ward to a bigger enclosure. The youngsters get more entertaining by the day, as their individual characters develop. [Read more](#) here.

In October 2012 we released a cheetah by the name of Susan onto Kapama Private Game Reserve. Susan was collared in order for us to be able to monitor her movements and how she was adjusting to life in the wild. [Read more about her release](#) here.

Lion's Den, one of the surviving rhino cows of a tragic poaching incident in August 2013, recently had another treatment procedure. It had been a little over five months since her last one. [Read more here.](#)

Although it has been almost two years and over 25 procedures since we began treatment on Lion's Den's wound, we are pleased with her overall improvement and can't wait for the day when her wound is completely healed.

Susan is doing remarkably well since her release. We were thrilled when she was spotted hunting close to the camp.

The collars that are fitted on the cheetahs are battery-operated and have a limited life span as our end goal is that released animals are eventually unhindered in the wild once they have been fully integrated.

Susan has been in the wild since 2012, and the time eventually came for her collar to be removed. [Read more here.](#)

For us, a success story such as this one is validation of what we work so hard to achieve.

One of the essential skills required in the wild is **animal tracking**. "Tracking is the identification of an animal by interpreting the signs left in its wake. The most common sign an animal leaves in the wild is its trail of paw prints".

If you thought the pigment melanin is something that is only limited to human beings, you'll be surprised to learn that it affects animals too. Our WCE students were astonished when they came across an **impala with a difference**.
