


CARACAL FOSTERING @ HESC



CARACALS UNDER THREAT

Although Caracals are not classified as an endangered Species, humankind once again poses a big threat to the survival of these species. Caracals are mostly killed for livestock predation, although this only occurs in a few of its ranges it still adds up to large numbers of deaths (2219 animals in one area alone). In other areas of its range, it fights hunting for its skin and for its meat, which some bush tribes consider being a luxury. Without the necessary education, and efforts by conservation institutions like HESC, the animals might well be on their way to being another endangered species.

WHY FOSTER A CARACAL?

- Caracal is very vocal animal that can meow, growl, purr and hiss
- Unique tufts on top of their ears working as a "windsock", ears controlled by about 20 muscles to locate their prey
- The back of the caracal's ears are black and topped with long black tufts
- It is the largest member of Africa's small cats
- Caracal can survive 12 years in the wild and up to 17 years in captivity
- Caracal is often killed by farmers which are trying to protect their livestock
- Luckily, population of caracals in the wild is still large and stable
- Possessing tremendous speed and agility, the caracal is a formidable predator capable of tackling prey two to three times its size

CARACAL AT HESC

HESC's offers a home to caracals that was orphaned, injured or confiscated, and are in need of rehabilitation. The rehabilitated caracals are sure to be released back into the wild.
